Another is Mario Desiati, who not only lived in Berlin but also set part of his novel *Spatriati*, which won the Strega Prize in 2022, in the city. From the first steps taken in the city, through varying lengths of stay, to the final farewell, intimate secrets and literary curiosities of the "metropolis" with a unique allure, as experienced by those who have, at least once in their lives, encountered it.

What happened to pleasure? One hundred and thirty-five years ago, in 1889, Gabriele D'Annunzio's *The Child of Pleasure* was published. Written when he was just 25, this youthful, sensual and provocative novel introduced a "feral note," as Benedetto Croce described it, into Italian literature, which was then largely dominated by Verga's verismo. What remains today of that 'pleasure'? And who shall continue to nurture it through a narrative of the twenty-first century that seems increasingly attuned to the theme of 'discomfort'? The response is offered by Giordano Bruno Guerri, a leading expert on D'Annunzio, historian and president of the Vittoriale, and by Giuseppe Culicchia, curator of the new *Radici* festival and author of a striking début from 30 years ago, where the notion of pleasure seems to wane into a fleeting mirage: *Tutti giù per terra*. #literaryprogramme #fiction

Her work ranges from the 2010 autobiography *La mia casa è dove sono* to her latest publication, *Cassandra a Mogadiscio* (2023). In 1938, Europe started to understand that the peace it had come to know was now nothing more than an illusion, as the continent was swiftly descending toward the brink of war. Some of the first to recognise this, though not all, were intellectuals, artists and writers. Marina Valensise has dedicated *Sul baratro* to them. *Città*, *artisti* e *scrittori* d'Europa alla vigilia della Seconda Guerra Mondiale is a passionate exploration of the anxieties, torments and even indifference that permeated the artistic and cultural circles of Europe's capitals on the eve of the Second World War. The book spans from Vienna to Budapest, Berlin to Paris, Prague to Moscow, and Rome to Brussels. As unsettling questions about the future and peace arise, the Roman author and German essayist Uwe Wittstock, renowned for his work *February 1933*. *The Winter of Literature*, which chronicles the devastating effects of Hitler's rise to power on Germany's literary and artistic spheres, delves into the position, role and fate of intellectuals amidst historical upheavals. *#literaryprogramme #history*

In order to guarantee the quality of the works, publishing houses are the recipients of the funding.
